Over twenty-five years ago, we founded this festival with a radical but simple belief: that Belfast needed a film festival, a space where film would not only entertain - but also challenge, inspire, and reflect the complexities of our world. We wanted to nurture and celebrate local filmmakers, to welcome international voices, and to gather audiences around powerful stories.

Since then, the Belfast Film Festival has spawned a sister festival - Docs Ireland, and together we have grown into one of the island's leading cultural platforms. The festivals have become an important meeting ground for creative talent, a catalyst for conversation, and a stage for vital voices too often unheard. Our curators have taken risks, spotlighted innovation, and engaged unflinchingly with political and social realities that shape our lives.

This year we are beyond thrilled to welcome Hollywood icon Lucy Liu on her first visit to Belfast, and look forward to hosting Ben Wheatley and Barry Ward, amongst a host of special guests. This milestone edition marks both a celebration and a turning point, a time to appreciate our collective achievements and look to 2035 with purpose and excitement.

The journey over these years would not have been possible without the vision and commitment of all our wonderful staff, board, volunteers and curators, alongside core funders NI Screen, Belfast City Council, Film HubNI, the BFI, and partners like QFT, Hastings Hotels and Birra Moretti to name but a few - to each and everyone of you, the filmmakers who bring their work, and the audiences who return each year - we extend a heartfelt go raibh míle maith agat - thank you so much.



DIE, MY LOVE

DIR. LYNNE RAMSAY

UK, CANADA, USA | ENGLISH | 118 MINS | 2025

The much-anticipated new film from Scottish auteur Lynne Ramsay sees her team up collaboratively with stars Jennifer Lawrence and Robert Pattinson. A film co-written by Ramsay alongside Enda Walsh and Alice Birch, and based on the novel by Ariana Harwicz, it centres around Grace (Lawrence), as she and her husband Jackson (Pattinson) move from New York to his family home in rural Montana.

After becoming a new parent, Grace starts to experience post-partum depression that descends into psychosis as she spends her days alone with

her newborn in a rambling country house. Stunning cinematography is from two time Oscar nominee (Atonement, Anna Karenina) Armagh's Seamus McGarvey. *Die, My Love* shows how robust Ramsay is as a filmmaker, using saturated colour and powerhouse performances in this passionate and sensual exploration of a woman's declining mental health

SAIPAN

DIRS. LISA BARROS D'SA & GLENN LEYBURN IRELAND, UK | ENGLISH | 103 MINS | 2024

Belfast Film Festival is delighted to present this much-anticipated film from Belfast directorial duo, Glenn Leyburn and Lisa Barros D'Sa. After the success of their previous films *Good Vibrations* (2012) and *Ordinary Love* (2019), Leyburn and d'Sa have returned with a comedydrama about the fall-out between Mick McCarthy and Roy Keane during the lead-up to the 2002 Japan World Cup.

Steve Coogan and Éanna Hardwicke give largerthan-life performances as the two famous and almost diametrically opposed personalities of Irish football. When the team arrives for pre-tournament training in Saipan, a small island in the western Pacific ocean, they find themselves without basic amenities like a football pitch and, well, footballs.

As tensions mount between manager and team captain, the already fragile relationship descends into surreal chaos. Leyburn and Barros D'Sa use their signature lo-fi style to capture the spirit of the age, and add much to the mythology of one of the most intriguing periods of football and sports media history.

ADNTAS

DIR. DAMIAN MCCANN IRELAND | IRISH | 91 MINS | 2025

Acclaimed local filmmakers Damian McCann and Sarah Gordon return with an Irish language thriller told in a punchy, Nolan-esque reverse narrative. Featuring terrific performances from huge figures of Irish cinema, Carrie Crowley, notably seen in the smash hit Irish breakout from 2022, An Cailín Ciúin (The Quiet Girl), and Bríd Brennan who teams up again with McCann after their collaboration in his previous film, Doinnean.

Aontas (in English: Union) is a fun and clever film from an innovative and cineliterate filmmaking partnership. With a talent for humour and building on cinematic convention, they bring us an Irish noir heist at a small town credit union that's a lot more than it seems

The Belfast Film Festival is thrilled to welcome Lucy Liu to its 25th edition of the festival, where she will receive the Réalta Award for an Exceptional and Compassionate Performance in Rosemead. Liu will also be present to introduce the Irish premiere of the film.

Critically acclaimed actress and filmmaker Lucy Liu is internationally recognised for roles in films that have grossed over \$3.7 billion worldwide, including Kill Bill, Charlie's Angels, Chicago, Set It Up, Presence and Red One. She produced and stars in the indie feature Rosemead which will be released in the US this December. The feature film made its world premiere at the Tribeca Festival, won Best Narrative Feature at the Bentonville Film Festival, and won the Prix du Public UBS audience award at the Locarno Film Festival where Liu also accepted its prestigious Career Achievement Award.

Liu earned Emmy nominations for *Ally McBeal* and *The Pirate Queen* (VR), and has produced and championed impactful documentaries including *Freedom's Fury* and *Redlight*.

A celebrated visual artist and longtime UNICEF Ambassador, Liu became only the second Asian American woman in nearly 60 years to receive a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

The Réalta Award, Irish for 'star', was created with the desire to honour ground-breaking actors and filmmakers who use their medium for the greater good.

After this event, Liu will introduce a screening of Rosemead at 5:30pm (see p.31).

NEW CINEMA





SIRĀT

DIR. OLIVER LAXE

FRANCE, SPAIN | SPANISH, FRENCH, ENGLISH, ARABIC | 115 MINS | 2025

Saying almost anything in advance about visionary director Oliver Laxe's fourth film seems too much like a spoiler. It should be enough just to say, "It's amazing; go and see it." Nevertheless, a lot has indeed been said since it went down a storm with critics on its initial screening at the Cannes Film Festival, and where it won the Jury Prize, earlier this year.

Given the Islamic name for the narrow bridge between heaven and hell, this film is like walking a tightrope stretched out along the breathtaking Moroccan landscape - accompanied by some banging beats. It's very much at home on the big screen, with the photography and soundscape being exactly why. It's a film that illustrates a particular kind of human vulnerability, but is also big, loud and at times totally insane.

You might laugh, you might cry, who knows? But if you see this film, completely gripped to a kind of unblinking incredulity, you won't be thinking about figuring out the profound metaphorical meaning until long after the credits roll.

A PRIVATE LIFE (VIE PRIVÉE)

DIR. REBECCA ZLOTOWSKI

FRANCE | FRENCH, ENGLISH | 103 MINS | 2025


Fans of Jody Foster will already be aware of her language skills - she attended a French school in Los Angeles and spoke the language from a young age. But few will have seen her perform in French, and here she and a fantastically watchable supporting cast of Daniel Auteuil and Matheiu Amalric play middle-class, middleaged Parisians with murder on their minds, as a mystery unfolds after a suspicious death.

Foster is typically adroit as renowned psychiatrist, Lillian Steiner, an American in Paris, who begins her own investigation into the death of her patient. As the chic and serious professional begins to pull at threads of intrigue, the film becomes an enjoyable genre-blending psycho-drama reminiscent of 1990s classics.

Festival regulars will recognise Park Ji-min, who starred in the award-winning, Return to Seoul, as Steiner's daughter-in-law.

DRACULA

DIR. RADU JUDE

ROMANIA, AUSTRIA, LUXEMBOURG, BRAZIL | ROMANIAN, GERMAN. ENGLISH | 170 MINS | 2025

One of the most flogged (un)dead horses in cinema history is wheeled out again by maverick auteur Radu Jude for this sprawling deconstruction of the Dracula myth.

Taking as its start point the figure of Vlad the Impaler, the mythic ruler of Romania who inspired much of the Dracula legend, the film becomes a fragmented mosaic examining the different roles the eponymous vampire has played throughout history. We watch a bawdy dinner show version where exploited actors are chased through the streets with stakes. We watch a love story unfold with a tragic ending. We watch Vlad the Impaler come back to life and see how his legend has become nothing more than tourist fodder. We watch a hack director try to use Al to make his new Dracula film...

This densely packed opus is brazenly absurd yet deeply political; Jude's shotgun approach to analysing cinema and history is refreshing and exhilarating. He mines a distinctive aesthetic from the clash of textures that defines our modern life. He incorporates silent cinema with iPhone footage, and kitschy Al generated images that speak to how ugly our culture is becoming. It is a complete contrast to his other film in the programme, as Jude says himself, "If 'Kontinental '25' is my answer to Roberto Rossellini... let's say that 'Dracula' is my love letter to Ed Wood."

In the year of yet another *Nosferatu* remake and the blockbuster *Sinners*, Jude's *Dracula* is must-see viewing.

KONTINENTAL '25

DIR. RADU JUDE

ROMANIA, SWITZERLAND, LUXEMBOURG, BRAZIL, UK | ROMANIAN, HUNGARIAN, GERMAN, LATIN, ENGLISH | 109 MINS | 2025

Excitingly one of two Radu Jude films in this year's programme, *Kontinental '25* was filmed as a small side project but went on to win the Silver Bear for Best Screenplay at the Berlin Film Festival earlier this year.

Shot entirely in Cluj on an iphone, the film follows the story of bailiff, Orsolya, who seeks philosophical solace in different places after a tragedy occurs during an eviction.

A comment on socio-political-economics in Romania, with references to cinema history, including its title (and probably many more stealthily packed-in Romanian cultural allusions that go over outsiders' heads), Jude's trademark dry wit and subtle symbolism make this film devastating and hilarious in equal measure. One of the most exciting auteurs working in the world today, this film shows just how good Radu Jude can be.

IT WAS JUST AN ACCIDENT

DIR. JAFAR PANAHI

IRAN, FRANCE, LUXEMBOURG | FARSI, ENGLISH | 105 MINS | 2025

The festival is delighted to present the 2025 Palme d'Or winning work from celebrated Iranian auteur Jafar Panahi.

Panahi puts together a seemingly benign construct of a family driving home when they accidentally hit a stray dog. But the event is laden with meaning that unfolds as the family pull into a garage for help. A domino effect takes place, with character after character being introduced in an attempt to identify the driver of the car, suspected of being a former government interrogator who terrorised the garage worker in the past.

In typical style, the film infuses the humor of everyday human interaction, the vulnerability of children, quotidian characters and comic-surreal moments alongside the backdrop of brutal political oppression. Knowing that Panahi himself has been imprisoned for the 'crime' of filmmaking makes this even more astute, as these regular people come to grips with state violence and a chance for revenge.

NOUVELLE VAGUE

DIR. RICHARD LINKLATERFRANCE | FRENCH | 106 MINS | 2025

Jean Luc Godard has often been misquoted as saying "the best way to criticise a film is to make one."

Nouvelle Vague considers this transition from restless film writer to restless film director. We follow Godard as he is spurred on by the success of Truffaut, as he convinces Jean Seberg this is the right film for her, and how he battles against his producer to do things his way. Linklater chronicles the production from day-to-day, highlighting Godard's spontaneous approach and the somewhat ramshackle techniques behind one of the most influential films of all time.

Filled to the brim with cameos from the pages of Cahiers du Cinema (Bazin, Truffaut, Demy, Varda to name but a few), this is an extremely charming love letter to film history. Godard is not painted as some inexplicable unreachable genius, but a coy and playful figure. Linklater underlines just how fun it must have been to create a work as liberated from convention as *Breathless*.

IF I HAD LEGS I'D KICK YOU

DIR. MARY BRONSTEIN
USA | ENGLISH | 113 MINS | 2025


Starring the hugely talented Rose Byrne as you've never seen her before, plus Conan O'Brien, Christian Slater and A\$AP Rocky, *If I Had Legs I'd Kick You* is a film that will head straight for your central nervous system and plug itself in.

Shot in intense close-up, the film follows stressedout mother Linda as she juggles the responsibility of a sick child, an apartment with a huge hole in the ceiling, judgement from pretty much every person she encounters (including her own therapist/ boss) and a husband who is almost entirely absent. Impossible to take your eyes from yet at points a watch-through-fingers film, this is a daring portrayal of the darker side of motherhood.

From the mumblecore-defining director of *Yeast*, Mary Bronstein, in a swift side-step of that genre, the film brilliantly captures spiraling anxiety in a seemingly never-ending cycle of if-you-don't-laugh-you'll-cry nightmare scenarios. Not for the faint hearted, but fortune favours the brave.

TWO PROSECUTORS

DIR. SERGEI LOZNITSA

FRANCE, GERMANY, NETHERLANDS, LATVIA, ROMANIA, LITHUANIA, UKRAINE | RUSSIAN, UKRAINIAN | 118 MINS | 2025

Awarded the François Chalais Prize, an award given to a film dedicated to the value of journalism, *Two Prosecutors* is a gripping portrayal of 1930s Stalinist Russia based on a suppressed story by gulag survivor, Georgy Demidov.

A young idealistic prosecutor investigates a high-security prisoner's story after receiving a startling letter. Starkly filmed and with a building claustrophobia and disorientation in scenes of cells, bureaucratic offices, official corridors and government antechambers, the film allows an increasing anxiety to pervade. A nightmarish portrayal of the malice of governmental machinery, the film is one of the most critically celebrated of the year.

Also an award-winning documentarian, Loznitsa's previous feature was the critically acclaimed black comedy *Donbass* (2018), an episodic film based on real accounts of the realities of life in occupied eastern Ukraine.

SENTIMENTAL VALUE

DIR. JOACHIM TRIER

NORWAY, GERMANY, DENMARK, FRANCE, SWEDEN, UK, TURKEY | NORWEGIAN, ENGLISH | 133 MINS | 2025

Joachim Trier returns to his beloved Oslo and another collaboration with the breakout star of his previous award-winning film, *The Worst Person in The World.*

This time Renate Reinsve plays Nora, whose estranged father, Gustav, comes back into her and her sister's life shortly after their mother's death. With Nora now an actress, her filmmaker father asks her to play the lead role of his mother in the new autobiographical film he's convinced will revive his career. With a nuanced performance from Stellan Skarsgard as Gustav, and Elle Fanning as a bemused Hollywood star who finds herself in the middle of a fictional, and real, unfolding family drama.

Touching, funny and cleverly contained within the walls of a well-worn family home, the film received a 19-minute standing ovation at the Cannes Film Festival in May where it won the Grand Prix. It will be the Norwegian entry for Best International Film at the 2026 Academy Awards.

THE SECRET AGENT

DIR. KLEBER MENDONÇA FILHO

BRAZIL, FRANCE, GERMANY, NETHERLANDS | PORTUGUESE | 158 MINS | 2025

Wagner Moura (Narcos, Civil War) exudes handsome leading-man vibes in this tense and moving 20th century political thriller from acclaimed director, Kleber Mendonça Filho.

In a role that won him the Best Actor award at the Cannes Film Festival this year, Moura plays a university researcher who comes under scrutiny from the Brazilian dictatorial regime that governed the country from the 1960s to the 1980s. Set in 1977, the film is a colour-saturated, evocative portrayal of the period and throws into relief how normal people are affected by the vice-grip of authoritarianism. With

fantastic supporting performances from an ensemble cast, and unnerving elements such as the vain and corrupt police who wield way too much influence, the film expertly weaves between the personal and the political. With more than a nod to cinema of the 1970s, this is a beautiful and bittersweet film with a historical story that seems firmly rooted in the present.

THE LOVE THAT REMAINS

DIR. HLYNUR PÁLMASON

ICELAND, DENMARK, SWEDEN, FRANCE | ICELANDIC, ENGLISH, SWEDISH, FRENCH, DANISH | 108 MINS | 2025

The wonderful Hlynur Pálmason returns after his critically acclaimed thriller-mystery, A White White Day and the sweepingly epic period piece, Godland.

In a slight departure from his previous style, *The* Love That Remains uses humour and surreal moments to tell the delicate story of a family going through a separation. Artist Anna makes large-scale metal sculptural works that she leaves to rust in the Icelandic landscape, while her husband Maggi spends most of his time working on a trawler out at sea. The symbolism is apt, as the two have the synergy of those who have lived together for a long time, but like land and sea are close together but completely apart.

The film quietly moves alongside their lives, showing their professional and personal frustrations with care and compassion as they navigate co-parenting. The absurdity of emotion is shown in some cleverly drawn moments of magical realism that highlight the underlying desires and fears of the two characters as they drift into a new phase of life.

Special mention for Panda, the family dog, whose performance won this year's Palme Dog (yes, that is a real award) at this year's Cannes Film Festival.

PROMISED SKY

DIR. ERIGE SEHIRI

TUNISIA, FRANCE, QATAR | FRENCH, ARABIC | 92 MINS | 2025

The third feature from French Tunisian director Erige Sehiri is a colourful and neorealist exploration of the intersecting lives of three Black African women in Tunis as they shelter a lost child.

Each of them having migrated to Tunisia from the Ivory Coast, the film follows pastor Marie, young mother Naney, previously taken in by the church, and student Jolie, the only of the three living in Tunis with 'papers', as they create a found family and begin to build a home for Kenza

A film that underscores the reality of anti-migrant sentiment around the world, plus the personal dangers faced by those on route, it also allows a window into the complex and precarious world of the undocumented in their new countries. As well as this, the film displays the depth of female relationships, support and collective caring, and shows that motherhood can take many forms.

IN TIME: DÓNAL LUNNY

DIR. NUALA O'CONNOR IRELAND | ENGLISH, IRISH | 95 MINS | 2025

Dónal Lunny is one of Ireland's most outstanding folk musicians and producers.

This is the first film account of his life, revealing a peerless contribution to Irish culture and music. A huge figure in Irish music, and known for guitar, bouzouki, keyboards and bodhrán, he is a founding member of Planxty, The Bothy Band and Moving Hearts. Throughout his career, Lunny helped revive and transform Irish traditional and folk music.

Director Nuala O'Connor presents a stylish documentary film that captures the wealth of Lunny's talent and influence. She will be present at the screening and take part in a short Q&A after the film.

TOMORROW'S

DIR. TERRY LOANE
UK | ENGLISH | 60 MINS | 2025

Blending the music documentary with a touching portrayal of trans experience, director Terry Loane returns with the inspirational story of pop star Dylan Holloway.

Shot primarily in personal video diary style by Dylan himself, the film blends family archive and interviews to capture the bravery and challenges of undergoing gender transition. Movingly, the film is centered around Dylan's changing singing voice and captures this as both a literal and metaphorical symbol of risk-taking, change and ultimately self-expression and discovery.

Singer-songwriter, Dylan Holloway will be in attendance at the screening and take part in a Q&A following the film.

MY FATHER'S SHADOW

DIR. AKINOLA DAVIES
UK, NIGERIA, IRELAND | ENGLISH, YORUBA | 94 MINS | 2025

Deftly told from a child's perspective, *My Father's Shadow* is a remarkable debut from British-Nigerian filmmaker, Akinola Davies.

Semi-autobiographical and co-written with his brother, Wale, the film follows two brothers as they leave their rural village and spend a rare day with their father in Lagos alongside the backdrop of the 1993 election. As the day goes on emotions build as political tensions rise and their father asks questions of his employer, while the boys see the fabric of vibrant city life in wide-eyed wonder.

Beautifully captured from the adoring and fascinated upward gaze of boys who deeply admire their father played expertly by *Gangs of London* and *Slow Horses* star, Sope Dirisu - the film is a heartfelt and authentic snapshot of a certain time and place in both Nigerian politics and personal family history.

LUCKY LU

DIR. LLOYD LEE CHOICANADA, USA | ENGLISH, CHINESE | 103 MINS | 2024

In this contemporary re-imagining of *Bicycle Thieves*, Lu is a delivery driver in New York City.

He has lived there alone for three years, saving to find an apartment for his wife and daughter to join him. On the day they are due to arrive, his e-bike is stolen and his building superintendent kicks him out. Lu must race to secure the life of the American Dream he's imagined for his family.

Lucky Lu begins as an angst-inducing pressure cooker of a film, following our protagonist as he races from job to job, navigating the grey labyrinth of traffic and dingey takeaways with the everpresent 'ding' of his delivery app guiding his every move. When his bike is taken, the precarious building blocks of his life begin to fall, exposing the Sisyphean nature of the migrant experience in an uncaring and uncompromising society. When his daughter arrives, and we see Lu's corner of New York through her eyes, the pulse dips and we see and feel the true toll that Lu's running and hustling has had. Anchored by a volatile yet sensitive performance from Chang Chen, this is an essential film for our moment.

ON THE SEA

DIR. HELEN WALSH UK | ENGLISH | 111 MINS | 2025

Set along the weathered coastline of North Wales, Jack works as a hand raker on the mussel beds alongside his younger brother and nephews. Married to his supportive wife Maggie but concerned that his son is hinting at not joining the family business, Jack's quiet, unremarkable life is disrupted when casual labourer, Daniel, arrives in the village. As the two men get to know each other, tensions build between family responsibility, prejudiced attitudes and the strong desire to live an authentic life.

With stunning central performances from Barry Ward and Lorne MacFadyen, this is a sensual and tonally astute second feature from British novelist, screenwriter and director, Helen Walsh.

Actor Barry Ward, whose previous work includes Jimmy's Hall, That They May Face The Rising Sun and Bad Sisters, will attend the event and take part in a post-screening Q&A.

A young Hungarian family moves to Vancouver. Through the eyes of eight-year-old Sasha, we witness the unnatural rhythms of adjusting to a new environment.

Set in the late 1990s, we watch as Sasha adapts to this new world of sundappled beach days and intimidating pool parties with the neighborhood girls. The excitement soon turns sour however, as the eldest sibling soon begins acting erratically. His declining behavior becomes cause for concern as he becomes a hazard to himself and his family. Years later, Sasha tries to reckon with her family history and understand both her brother and her parents. A sensitive rumination on the fragility of memory and the lasting effects of grief.

Director of numerous acclaimed shorts, Sophy Romvari has developed a keen eye for detail, underscoring the poetic and lyrical with a touch of uncertainty. Her debut feature is at once rich, warm and inviting, as well as challenging and heartbreaking. *Blue Heron* is filled with an immense emotional texture that blurs the line between fiction, non-fiction and subjective memory.

BELGIUM | FRENCH, ENGLISH, TURKISH | 79 MINS | 2025

With seemingly everyone talking about transplant tourism these days, this touching comedy about two men bonding over baldness has come along at just the right time.

After a chance meeting, Jérémy and Baptiste decide to go to Turkey to get hair transplants together. Almost total strangers, the two embark on a highly personal shared experience in a foreign country. Negotiating medical appointments in English (almost no one speaks their language, French), and at times with heightened emotions leading to awkward situations, they come to terms with these new versions of themselves.

Funny, heartfelt and honest, the film stars two friends of the director who are not actors, but two people who really wanted to get hair transplants. The procedures in the film are real, and most of the other performers are non-actors who the team met along the way. The result is a truthful, documentary-like film that captures Turkey at a pivotal moment during the 2023 elections.

FIOR DI LATTE

DIR. CHARLOTTE ERCOLI USA, ITALY | ENGLISH | 85 MINS | 2025

They say smell is intricately tied with memory, just a sniff can transport you to the past via the canyons of the mind.

For struggling playwright Mark, the memories of his most treasured holiday, a brief trip to Italy, are the source of his inspiration and his frustration. In an attempt to find new ideas for a script which will star the love of his life (his reluctant flatmate who resents him), he returns to the scent of a perfume from that vacation. Tragedy strikes when he loses the last trace of the fragrance, and he is forced to resort to desperate measures to find that smell, find the inspiration he needs and fulfill his ultimate dreams.

This offbeat comedy gem is the feature debut of Charlotte Ercoli, featuring an all-star cast of Tim Heidecker, Kevin Kline, Julia Fox and Fisher Stevens to name but a few. Like our protagonist's flights of fancy, the film's dreamlike structure gives way to flashbacks, idle reveries and musical numbers on a whim. Heidecker's central performance of a stunted manchild obsessed with pop-cultural detritus speaks to our culture's current obsession with the past-trapped in a nostalgic world that no longer exists and lashing out at anything new or original. Thankfully, this highly original film will combat those fears.

Young Londoner Jonah is a victim of our modern age - overstimulated, overexcited and overwhelmed.

In serious need of a break, he travels with his best friend Lee to the north-east coast of Scotland. On this rugged unforgiving coastline, they almost immediately run into trouble in the first pub they set foot in. After making friends with Charlie, a deaf man living in the shadow of his troublesome brother, the trio soon begin to relax and adapt to a more peaceful style of life.

This feature debut is a tender and sensitive portrait of young masculinity in a time when aggression and resilience is favoured above all. Through their unexpected circumstances and ensuing friendship, our three protagonists learn how to be vulnerable. The beautiful Scottish landscapes are a wide open vista for them to express themselves and scream into the wind. Ultimately, *The Son and the Sea* is a film which slows down with the characters. When we reach the end of the journey, we too may find a transcendent sense of understanding.

They had a beautiful boy named Joe and opened a successful printing business in Los Angeles' San Gabriel Valley. But since Charles died, she struggles to hold on to the life they've made even as Joe struggles with schizophrenia. Like many Chinese people, Irene believes that a son's troubles are a mother's sole responsibility, and that mental illness is something to be ashamed of. Her isolation becomes both her shield and her prison.

Inspired by an award-winning Los Angeles Times article by Frank Shyong, *Rosemead* depicts a sprawling community and culture rarely ever seen in film: the Chinese diaspora in L.A.'s San Gabriel Valley. Featuring a transformative, tour-de-force performance by Lucy Liu, this timely story reckons with a myriad of urgent social issues, but ultimately, it is a heart-wrenching story about love: a son's love for his parents, a mother's love for her son, and the lengths she would go to protect him, even from himself

On the day of his father's funeral, a young man loses the ability to speak. Needing a guick fix, his mother takes him to an unexpected place for an unexpected solution. This dark and unsettling comedy digs deep into the Irish psyche and roots around, finding humour in grief, trauma and mysterious country healers blessed with 'the cure'



DIR. THOMAS BENNETT | 20 MINS

An elliptical jigsaw puzzle of a film. Gabriel's Trumpet follows a string of young people across Belfast as they come to terms with a shocking disappearance, a wave of riots, and a standing stone that seems to haunt the very tape the film is shot on. Captured in bewitching digital textures and featuring an ensemble of brilliant performers, this is an affecting film which evokes the Belfast of today and that inescapable endof-times feeling.

In the middle of a brutal heatwave, transgender man Owen takes a pregnancy test. Left reeling, he returns to the flat of his occasional lover Seán to talk about their relationship, and if he sees a future together. This intense and emotionally-charged two-hander features stunning performances from Pete MacHale & Diarmuid Noyes, capturing the bittersweet rush of a summer fling on the rocks.



Feeling overwhelmed and trapped by life, a young woman reaches out for help. Her colleague's husband comes to her house and tries to teach her how to reconnect with herself. Nolan evokes the inner self through a rich visual language and layered sound design, creating a deeply-felt kaleidoscopic portrait. Initially an exploration of anxiety and overstimulation, *Internal Bleeding* transforms into a soft and gentle exercise in meditation and slowing down.

Watching as people rankle at her self-expression then buy work that seems shallow in comparison, she descends into a self-destructive spiral that pushes the boundaries of her own artwork. A darkly comic satire which cuts as deep into the local art scene as it does into flesh and blood.



DIRS. ELLIE WILDMAN, CONOR TONER | 13 MINS

A lonely widower has settled for his lonely routine, stuck in his lonely ways. Until one day an informercial lights up his life and he buys a 'Grow Your Own Girlfriend' kit. All he has to do is add water; what could go wrong? This wonderfully bizarre comedy is as funny as it is moving, gleefully tongue in cheek and packed to the gills with visual invention.

When surveying the blockbuster landscape of the multiplexes today, everyone seems obsessed with multiverses. Rather than being invested in the scientific and philosophical ramifications of such ideas, studios and moviegoers are more interested in maximising profits for intellectual properties.

Ben Wheatley's *Bulk* spits in the face of such cynical ventures and presents a gloriously madcap plunge into the unknown. Our protagonist Corey Harlan, a cool cat in the mould of Bogart or Belmondo, is thrust into a complex web of mystery surrounding elusive scientist Anton Chambers. His experiments with string theory have gone too far, exploding and breaking down the dimensions of reality. All Harlan

Bulk is a gleefully freewheeling genre flick, recalling Alphaville and Quatermass as much as it does Thunderbirds. Wheatley revels in its handmade style, playfully utilising back-projection, model car chases and cardboard guns. This is a lo-fi odyssey to behold, and not to be missed on the big screen.

LESBIAN SPACE PRINCESS

DIRS. LEELA VARGHESE & EMMA HOUGH HOBBS AUSTRALIA | ENGLISH | 87 MINS | 2025

A punchy animated comedy from Australian writer-directors, Leela Varghese and Emma Hough Hobbs, this space adventure won the 2025 Teddy Award, the Berlin Film Festival's long-standing queer cinema award.

The story follows Saira, once voted most boring gay in royal space, as she reels from a break-up with the charismatic Kiki, only to discover she's been kidnapped by the Straight White Maliens. An intergalactic quest ensues, as Saira strives not just to get her back but also to get her back.

With a quick-witted script and fantastic ensemble cast of voice-artists, the film plays with audience expectation and features some original folky, wistful guitar songs composed by Varghese. It's a welcome bubble of queer joy that doesn't take itself too seriously and offers a warm and funny antidote to life's troubles.

DEAD LOVER

DIR. GRACE GLOWICKI CANADA | ENGLISH | 86 MINS | 2025

John Waters and Frankenstein's monster walk into a bar. They pal around and decide to make a film. They might come up with something similar to *Dead Lover*.

Lonesome and forlorn, a gravedigger who stinks of corpses reluctantly tends to her daily duties. After a chance encounter at a funeral, she meets the man of her dreams, a foppish dandy, and falls head over heels. However just as life begins to smell of roses, her new-found beau tragically drowns, leaving behind only a finger lopped off in the accident. Fuelled by the power of love, our romantic hero becomes a mad scientist in her attempts to cheat death and resurrect her lover.

This sexually-charged fable beautifully revels in its lustful desires and grotesque impulses, brought to life in German Expressionist style with a richly textured 16mm aesthetic and featuring a wonderful score from U.S. Girls. Performed by a dedicated troupe of just four actors, this is a wonderfully absurd comedy/horror/romance with sincere DIY charm. *Dead Lover* is unashamedly grotesque, earnest and horny; its smell will linger with you for days.

FUCKTOYS

DIR. ANNAPURNA SRIRAM USA | ENGLISH | 107 MINS | 2025

Sex worker AP is cursed. All the psychics agree. The only way out of it? A slaughtered lamb and one thousand dollars.

Thus begins a twisted odyssey through the streets of Trashtown, a surreal microcosm of America encompassing non-binary cowboys, absurd mansion parties and Tom of Finland cops. Travelling on her moped from client to scheme to opportunity, her high-intensity hustling is a highly camp yet white-knuckle thrill ride through the underbelly of modern USA. She might be about to enact a sacrificial ritual but she might as well have some fun along the way.

Starring writer, producer and director Annapurna Sriram in her feature debut, alongside an outstanding ensemble cast, Fucktoys is an arresting piece of work. As well as being smart, funny and heartbreaking, the film doesn't neglect the danger of being a sex worker, with the precarity of AP's profession never too far out of frame. The film is a beauty to behold, composed of striking anamorphic vistas shot on 16mm and drenched in the neon colours of the underground, this will probably be the most beautiful film reveling in trash and bad taste you'll see all year.

TROUBLE THE CALM & Q&A

DIR. DAVID FOX 53 MINS | 1989

Commissioned by Channel 4 and broadcast in 1989 as part of 'The Eleventh Hour', *Trouble the Calm* is a documentary that explores Ireland's political complicities.

It observes the annual Irish Management Institute (IMI) conference with Michael Smurfit, Tony O'Reilly, and Charles Haughey, and records the wives of political prisoners as they campaign outside it. They ask (then Taoiseach) Haughey, 'what is going to happen us?' once their husbands are extradited from Portlaoise to prisons in the north. Their ostracization is juxtaposed with shots of the primary school history class of the formidable Ms Mary Jo O'Connor from Kerry. Cut between audio and news excerpts, director David Fox contemplates the distance of southern Ireland's economic self-interest from the foundational principals of its past.

David Fox is artist and filmmaker from Dublin, based in Kerry. He was a founder member of Faction Films in London and has made many documentaries for television including for RTÉ, Arte, BBC & Channel 4.

Isobel Harbison is an Irish art historian and Senior Lecturer at Goldsmiths, London, currently working on 'Recording History,' an oral history project with artist filmmakers active in the north of Ireland from 1968, with IMMA, the Ulster Museum and PRONI.

ZODIAC KILLER PROJECT

DIR. CHARLIE SHACKLETON

Charlie Shackleton returns to Belfast with another innovative and thought-provoking documentary exploration. With humor and self-examination, he presents a film about a film that never happened, his proposed streamer service doc on the infamous Zodiac Killer.

These days, the two channels have a lot more competition from other terrestrial stations, satellite services and screening platforms, but they were once the biggest rivals around. With this in mind, we present footage of their charismatic star from both

archives, making this... the clash of the titan. How will giant of the small screen Boyce compete with himself? Who will win?

Following our previous archival explorations such as *The Weird & The Eerie, WERK!* and last year's *Ulster Mirror,* this will be a one-off screening using valuable archive footage and music to celebrate a unique personality.

ULSTER SAYS NO -THE YEAR OF DISORDER

DIR. EVAN MARSHALL, EDITOR PAUL MCCLINTOCK 88 MINS

In November 1985, the British and Irish governments signed an agreement for closer cooperation on the issue of Northern Ireland and the setting up of formal intergovernmental bodies. The Agreement was rejected both by Sinn Fein and the main Unionist parties. However, it was the opposition from Unionism which pitched Northern Ireland into a year of turmoil.

In a huge rally at the Belfast City Hall, Ian Paisley made his famous "Never! Never! Never!" speech and the die was cast for a period of unrest and disorder which threatened to pitch the country into open civil war. Created entirely from archive footage, Ulster Says No follows the tumultuous events as seen through the contemporary lens of the Ulster Television news teams.

From the iconic poster campaign, to the ill-fated "invasion" of Clontibret in the Republic of Ireland, the situation quickly deteriorated. Finally, red berets were donned and a new organisation called Ulster Resistance openly threatened armed opposition to the government. This is the story of how Northern Ireland almost tipped into the abyss.

The equinox marks the end of summer and the beginning of Autumn and is the day when the sun illuminates the northern and southern hemispheres of the earth equally. In Ireland it is a date steeped in rituals, traditions and folklore spanning thousands of years; from the alignment of Neolithic structures to the sun, the pagan festival of Mabon, to harvest practices and traditions.

Using archive film sourced from Northern Ireland Screen's Digital Film Archive and BBC Rewind, the film moves chronologically through both the eons of time, and a single harvest day in Ireland - weaving together astrological visuals, standing stones, the abundance of nature and harvests past.

These visuals are mixed live, to accompany an extraordinary score composed and performed by RÓIS, an Irish composer, multi-instrumentalist and performer whose songs explores diverse modes of expression; forging an idiosyncratic blend of folk and Sean-nós, electronics, jazz harmony and extended vocal techniques. The soundtrack uses traditional songs and instruments along-side experimental sounds, as well as incorporating clips from the Ulster Folk Museum sound archives.



From the twisted minds behind the sitcom of the year, *Funboys*, comes this darkly funny psychological drama about family and identity.

Raymond is stuck. He's stuck stacking shelves. He's stuck living with middle-class students who don't understand him. He's stuck in his own head, unable to make his mind up. After a chance encounter with his former foster brother Jerdy on a night out, Raymond rediscovers a part of himself he'd long forgotten. Loose-cannon Jerdy soon moves in with Raymond, to the chagrin of his housemates. When things soon get out of hand, Raymond tries to cut ties with Jerdy, but he's not going without a fight.

How much do we owe to the person we used to be? This is at the heart of *Housejackers* and the tricky relationship between Raymond and Jerdy, as they try to navigate a once close brotherhood that has drifted apart. They are brought to life by Finnian Garbutt and John Travers in two magnetic performances that are just as raw and vulnerable as they are funny. The film pokes fun at the surreal chaos of student housing and the absurd banality of being in your mid-20s. Lennon's feature debut is a distinctly Northern Irish comedy, it's bold and hilarious but sensitive and moving. A film of rising stars in front of and behind the camera.

HUNGER

DIR. STEVE MCQUEEN
IRELAND/UK | ENGLISH | 96 MINS | 2008

Turner Prize winning artist Steve McQueen made his feature directorial debut with this film which won the Camera d'Or in Cannes before making its UK & Ireland premiere in Belfast with a special festival screening in 2008.

In 1981, Irish Republican Army member Bobby Sands leads a hunger strike in protest of the British Government's refusal to recognise him and his fellow inmates as political prisoners. The harsh brutality of the prison environment is conveyed through hypnotic yet understated visuals and humanist vignettes. Sands' descent and the slow transformation of his body is portrayed with equal parts beauty and horror. "Good Vibrations is not just a record shop. It's not just a label. It's a way of life."

This rollicking tale of Terri Hooley and the rise of punk music during the Troubles instantly became a classic of Northern Irish cinema. The film made its world premiere in 2012 when it opened the Belfast Film Festival, before going on to screen (and win awards) around the world.

Terri Hooley is a radical, rebel and music-lover in 1970s Belfast when the bloody conflict known as the Troubles shuts down his city. As all his friends take sides and take up arms, Terri opens a record shop on the most bombed half-mile in Europe and calls it Good Vibrations. Through it he discovered a compelling voice of resistance in the city's nascent underground punk scene. Galvanising the young musicians into action, he becomes the unlikely leader of a motley band of kids and punks who join him in his mission to create a new community, an alternative Ulster, to bring his city back to life.

The perfect chance to revisit an old favourite before seeing the latest flick from directors Lisa Barros D'Sa and Glenn Leyburn, *Saipan*.
